## **Purpose of the Course**

This is an introductory course in Latin American Politics. We will consider several of the most important countries of the region and discuss current politics, including their ongoing development of democracy. The class will proceed using lectures and discussion sections. In the first class we will also discuss extra credit presentations in class.

## Requirements

We will have two required essay exams during the course of the semester and one final think paper that requires you to talk about the course material as a whole. Additionally, we may have one optional exam during the semester, depending upon the sentiment of the class. Each of the two required exams during the semester is worth 25% of your grade; the final paper is worth 40% of your grade. Class attendance and participation will count for 10% of your grade. If we have an optional exam the weight of each exam will be adjusted accordingly.

Extra Credit. There are several options for extra credit in this class. These involve the opportunity to do some extra reading or to view a movie and report on it to the class. We will also discuss the possibility of inserting a special section on the new Pope. This would be a section to be researched and presented by a small group of students for extra credit for this class. If you are interested in extra credit please raise your hand when we get to this discussion.

Depending upon the progress of this class we may have a reading and research day in October or early November. You could use that day to catch up on your reading or to watch one or more of the multiple movies that pertain to understanding Latin American politics or to start your work on the final think paper.
