

LIN6720 Introduction to Second Language Acquisition (Spring 2021)

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Class Meeting Times

This is a 98% synchronous online class, which means that we will meet regularly on Tuesdays and Thursdays for class on Zoom, and we will have at least one so-called "touchpoint" (a face-to-face meeting) during the semester. Here are the Zoom meeting IDs and passcodes for the class meetings:

Our class sessions may be audio-visually recorded for students in the class to refer back and for enrolled students who are unable to attend live. Students who participate with their camera engaged or utilize a profile image are agreeing to have their video or image recorded. Likewise, students who un-mute during class and participate orally are agreeing to have their voice recorded. If you are not willing to consent to have your voice recorded during class, you will need to keep your mute button activated and communicate exclusively using the "chat" feature, which allows students to type questions and comments live. Course Description

In this class, we will familiarize ourselves with key concepts, theories, and empirical research on child and adult second language acquisition (SLA).

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, you will have acquired the ability to intelligently discuss aspects of the theory and practice of language learning based on knowledge of the scholarly research in the field. You will also have learned how to analyze learner data both for research purposes and to inform ESL teaching practice.

Course Credit Requirements and Grading

Terminology Reviews: 18% (2% each)

You are responsible for 9 terminology reviews, each counting 3% towards your final grade. In these reviews, you are asked to provide short definitions (like in a glossary) for key terms and

concepts covered in the referenced chapter. The terminology reviews are due on the dates listed on the course schedule and are submitted on Canvas.

Exams: 30% (10% each)

Exams. There are 3 exams. Each exam counts towards 11% towards your final grade. The exams will be due on the dates listed on the course schedule and are submitted on Canvas.

Discussion Boards: 30% (5% each)

You will participate in 6 Discussion Boards that summarize key content and give commentary on 6 video lectures that address different key issues in contemporary second language acquisition research. Specific instructions for each Discussion Board are provided on Canvas. The Discussion Board responses are due on the due dates shown on the course schedule and are submitted on Canvas.

Theory Presentations: 15%

Groups of one or more students will give a presentation that summarizes a chapter in [VKW]. The presentation should be 15 minutes long. A draft of the presentation must be submitted to Prof. Wulff via email one week before the presentation is scheduled (swulff@ufl.edu). Late submission reduces the maximum score by 2.5 points for each day that the submission is late.

Theory Discussion Boards: 16% (2% each)

You will participate in 8 Discussion Boards that respond to questions about a particular theory of second language acquisition. Specific instructions for each Discussion Board are provided on Canvas. The Discussion Board responses are due on the due dates shown on the course schedule and are submitted on Canvas.

Attendance and Participation

Attendance is mandatory for all class meetings. You are allowed to miss up to three 50-minute class periods (lectures and TA sections combined) without any excuse. Each further unexcused absence will lower your grade by one level (e.g. from an A to A-). Excused absences must be consistent with university policies in:
