Course Description

MHF 4102: Basic axioms and concepts of set theory. Students present proofs. Credit will be given for, at most, MHF 4102 or MHG 5107. 3 credits

MHF 5107: Basic axioms and concepts of set theory, axiom of choice, Zorn's lemma, Schroder-Bernstein theorem, cardinal numbers, ordinal numbers, and the continuum hypothesis. 3 credits

Course Pre-Requisites / Co-Requisites

MHF 4102: MAS 4105 with a minimum grade of C.

Course Objectives

Students who successfully complete the course will be able to understand and apply the basic axioms and concepts of set theory. They will be able to read, write and present theorems and proofs in higher mathematics.
