Course Description

This course is designed as a broad introduction to Environmental Policy and Administration. These fields are exciting areas of discourse because they explicitly connect nature and society. The resulting policy framework influences our everyday lives – they can potentially affect public health, and the state of our environment. The course is designed for distance learning, so participation in discussion boards and with the assignments are key to helping students engage with the content.

This course examines fundamental topics surrounding Environmental Politics and Policy. As future administrators or political actors, you will be expected to address these challenges, as well as adapt to a changing environment. This course is intended to expose students to a variety of problems that governments face, and the assignments are created to encourage critical thinking in response to real life scenarios. How we choose to manage these activities will affect global-scale resource management, urban & regional planning, and sustainable growth challenges that lie at the intersection of the natural and built environment.

The primary learning objectives are for students to:

- Understand why Environmental Policy exists
- Evaluate the advantages and challenges of citizen involvement in environmental policy
- Develop a basic understanding of the growing trans-boundary character of environmental concerns
- Consider the difficulty in coordinating responses from a coalition of governments (in federalism and globally)

Assignments

There will be assignments every other week that are intended to help students understand the readings, and to provide exercises that allow you to apply your knowledge to real life scenarios that administrators face. The assignments are **due Friday before 11:59 pm** for the week of the assignment.

Ouizzes

A quiz will be given for each week and will test your knowledge of the assigned readings. Each quiz will be timed and have five questions. Students will have one minute per question.

Participation

Each student will be required to participate in the discussion board each week. For each week, students will receive 0.6 points for their initial post on the discussion topic and then 0.2 points for each response to two other student's initial post (total of 0.4 points for the response) There will be ten discussion posts worth 1 point each.

Midterm Examination

A midterm will be administered via Proctor U that will cover the material in the first half of the course. The midterm will be 50 multiple choice questions.

Final Examination

The final examination will be administered via Proctor U. It is not be cumulative. The final exam will be 50 multiple choice questions.

Make-up Exams and Late Papers

It is expected that no students will miss any exams. An unexcused absence on an exam results in a grade of 0%. Assignments not turned in by their due date will incur a grade reduction of 10% every day after the deadline (and will not be accepted if it is more than 2 days late). Since assignments are submitted through E-learning, this applies to all students (even those with excused absences). No planned opportunities for extra credit exist in this course.
